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MR. REUBEN DUNCAN NAMED 2023 NEW HAMPSHIRE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE YEAR

The New Hampshire School Administrators Association, in coordination with the American Association of School Administrators, has announced that Mr. Reuben Duncan is the New Hampshire Superintendent of the year for 2023.

Mr. Duncan, Superintendent of Schools for the Jaffrey-Rindge Cooperative School District (SAU #47) will receive a special award during the AASA National Conference on Education in San Antonio, TX, in February 2023.



Reuben was selected for this honor by a panel of his peers and from a distinguished group of nominees. David Dustin, Jaffrey-Rindge Middle/Conant High School principal, said, "I think it's easiest to say that anyone who has had the honor of working with Reuben, whether a parent, community member, learner, parent, or staff member, walks away with a new connection and support, a powerful vision for learning, and relentless drive to meet the needs of every learner."

Patricia Layfield, SAU #47 Student Services Director, remarked, "In the years that I have worked with Reuben, I have witnessed extraordinary vision, leadership, compassion and district growth due to his leadership skills...He is known by name across the district by not only staff but also by students...he subs in the buildings, he interacts with learners regularly, he knows them by name and knows about them."

Reuben's educational background includes a Bachelor of Arts from Cedarville University; a Master of Education from the University of New Hampshire, and a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies (CAGS) from Plymouth State University. He is currently enrolled in the Doctoral Program at Southern New Hampshire University focusing on Educational Leadership.

Reuben became Superintendent of Schools in SAU #47 in 2015, where he remains today.

Reuben currently serves as a long-standing member of the New Hampshire School Administrators Association and has previously served as a member and officer of several nonprofit organizations, including the New Hampshire Dance Institute and Keene Housing Kids Collaborative.

DR. MARK MACLEAN NAMED EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS ASSOCIATION

Board has unanimously selected
Dr. Mark MacLean as
NHSAA's new Executive Director.

Dr. MacLean, Superintendent of Schools for the Merrimack Valley and Andover School Districts (SAU #46), will assume the role on July 1 pending successful contract negotiations. He will succeed Dr. Carl Ladd, who will retire on June 30.

The Executive Director reports directly to the NHSAA President and is responsible for professional leadership and day-to-day management of the Association. The Director is charged with the further development of NHSAA and will provide leadership for strategy, organizational development, implementation, financial oversight, and revenue generation.

Following Dr. Ladd's intention to retire, the Executive Board committed to a comprehensive process to identify and vet all viable candidates. The Executive Board opened a nationwide search last fall.

Applicants were reviewed by a Search/Interview Committee comprised of the four Executive Board officers and a representative of each of NHSAA's five regions. The Committee solicited feedback from educators across the state about the qualities and vision they would like to see in the next Executive Director, which informed questions to be asked during interviews.

The Committee invited three candidates, all current New Hampshire superintendents, for interviews. Following deliberations, the Committee unanimously forwarded Dr. MacLean to the full Executive Board.

The Executive Board accepted the Committee's recommendation in a unanimous vote on Friday, Feb. 3. "Screening Committee members placed great value in a strong track record of innovation and a passionate advocacy for students and their families, and someone who has been active in educational issues on the local, state, and national levels," President Holden said.

"We were extremely fortunate to have three strong final candidates. Dr. MacLean's thoughtfulness, solutions-based approach, and positive outlook make him the right person to lead our organization into the future," President Holden said.

Dr. MacLean has served as superintendent of SAU #46, serving the towns of Andover, Boscawen, Loudon, Penacook, Salisbury, and Webster, since 2014. He was honored as NHSAA's New Hampshire Superintendent of the Year in 2020.

Dr. MacLean began his career in education as a Business and Computer Education teacher at Newport Middle High School in Newport in 1994. He also worked as a Dean of Academics at Alvirne High School in Hudson, and Assistant Superintendent in the Kearsarge Regional School District in New London before arriving at SAU #46.

He served on the governing board of the American Association of School Administrators (AASA) from 2016 to 2022, and has chaired the NHSAA's Executive Board Legislative Committee since 2018.

Dr. MacLean has earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from the University of New Hampshire; a Master of Science in Business Education from New Hampshire College (now Southern New Hampshire University); and both a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies and a doctorate in Learning, Leadership and Community from Plymouth State University.

Dear colleagues,

Congratulations ~ you successfully reached and passed the halfway point of the 2022-2023 school year! Thank you to each of you for all you have done in support of your students and educational communities during this past fall and early winter months. It has been milder winter weather; even the robins are confused as we all start the countdown to spring 2023.

But it will be winter for a while. Winnipesaukee recently declared "ice in" on February 4, one of the latest dates according to official reports from Gilford's Emerson Aviation. Perhaps you knew already that for those pilots to declare "ice in", all five ports visited by the M/S Mount Washington must be covered with ice. Just a bit of NH trivia!

Temperatures do remain rather warm in some districts' school board meetings, state board meetings, legislative hearings, and other forums. This sometimes-heated atmosphere has impacted decisions that are made everywhere from within our NH state capitol buildings to our local community meeting houses. Some of our politicians and some of our families are promoting choices that include homeschooling, private schools, or charter schools. However, New Hampshire educators remain committed to the almost 162,000 students attending our NH public schools. Creative solutions to student needs continue to be a hallmark of New Hampshire's educational community. While the demand for providing quality public education will not go away and the criticism is nothing new, that "noise" cannot drown out the value and the reward of working with our school communities in support of all kids. Truly, working as "champions for children" is not a job for the weak of heart – but certainly worth it!

New Hampshire has seen an uptick in students attending our NH public charter schools, as we know. In November the NH department of education reported just over 5,500 students attending charter schools. While there is some impact on general education classrooms, the growing numbers of students attending charter schools have had an impact on the provision of special education services at those schools and within the local district. Under SB 232 (2022) before the start of the 2023-2024 school year, the districts and charter schools must have an agreed-upon Memorandum of Understanding that should help clarify the roles and responsibilities for special education services at the charter schools.

Governor Sununu signed SB 399, a bipartisan bill that extended special education eligibility to age 22, effective June 17, 2022. Stay tuned this spring when rulemaking begins to make those necessary changes to the official special ed rule book, "Guide to the NH Standards for the Education of Children with Disabilities", and the "Special Education Procedural Safeguards".

The complexities of student services are not new to New Hampshire or any other state. The staffing shortages are real, but districts are doing what they can to "grow their own" and work with the NH departments of credentialing and licensing to meet those demands. Under IDEA, certified providers as required while the need for student services has grown statewide. Even so, NH parents still report satisfaction with special education services.

Thank you for your continued support of our Association, our NHSAA office team, and your colleagues. If we can be of any assistance, we always welcome your feedback and suggestions.
